OOI KEE BENG was born and raised in Penang, and is presently the Deputy Director of the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies (ISEAS), Singapore.

He is also Editor of the Penang Institute's *Penang Monthly* (www.penangmonthly.com). He was Visiting Associate Professor at City University of Hong Kong and Adjunct Associate Professor at the Department of Southeast Asian Studies at the National University of Singapore. His PhD thesis is titled *The State and its Changdao: Sufficient Discursive Commonality in National Renewal, with Malaysia as Case Study*. This was completed at Stockholm University's Department of Chinese Studies, where he was a lecturer for several years.

His books include *The Right to Differ: A Biographical Sketch of Lim Kit Siang* (2011); *In Lieu of Ideology: An Intellectual Biography of Goh Keng Swee* (2010); *Between Umno and a Hard Place: The Najib Razak Era Begins* (2010); *Arrested Reform: The Undoing of Abdullah Badawi* (2009); *Malaya's First Year at the United Nations* (2009); *March 8: Eclipsing May 13* (2008); *Lost in Transition: Malaysia under Abdullah* (2008); *Chinese Strategists: Beyond Sun Zi's Art of War* (2007); *Continent, Coast and Ocean: Dynamics of Regionalism in Eastern Asia* (2007, co-edited with Ding Choo Ming); and *The Reluctant Politician: Tun Dr Ismail and His Time* (2006).

The Reluctant Politician won the “Award of Excellence for Best Writing Published in Book Form on Any Aspect of Asia (Non-Fiction)” at the Asian Publishing Convention Awards 2008, while *Continent, Coast, Ocean: Dynamics of Regionalism in Eastern Asia* was named “Top Academic Work” in 2008 by the ASEAN Book Publishers Association (ABPA). He has also translated several Chinese classics on strategy into Swedish and English. These are collected into *Sunzis krigskonst och sju andra kinesiska mästerverk* (with Bengt Pettersson and Henrik Friman, Santérus 2010) and *Chinese Strategists* (2007).

He writes opinion pieces regularly for regional and global mass media on Malaysian matters (see wikibeng.com), including in *The Edge Malaysia*. His most recent books are *Done Making Do: 1Party Rule Ends in Malaysia* (2013) and *ISEAS Perspective: Selections 2012–13* (editor, 2014).
