Michael Lim Mah-Hui is a Senior Fellow at the Asian Public Intellectuals' Program, Nippon Foundation. He is also a Senior Fellow at the Socio-Economic and Environmental Research Institute (SERI) in Penang, Malaysia.

Dr Lim's professional background spans thirty years as an international banker and academician. He has worked in major international banks, including Chemical Bank (now JP Morgan Chase) in New York and Tokyo, Credit Suisse First Boston in Singapore and Hong Kong, Deutsche Bank in Singapore and Jakarta, Standard Chartered Bank in Jakarta, and the Asian Development Bank in Manila. Prior to his banking career, he did research in and taught Political Economics and Sociology at Duke University, Temple University and the University of Malaya.

Dr Lim has a multi-disciplinary background in finance, economics and politics. He received his B.A. (Honours) in Economics from the University of Malaya; a Masters in International Affairs, a Masters in Sociology, and a Ph.D. in Development Studies from the University of Pittsburgh; and Certificate of Business Administration from Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania.

Most recently, he has extensively researched and delivered public lectures on the global financial crisis throughout Asia.

Lim Chin is a Professor of Economics at the Department of Strategy and Policy, NUS Business School, National University of Singapore (NUS). Prior to joining NUS in 1986, he taught at the University of Western Ontario, Canada. His publications on the behaviour of firms, market structure, market contestability, labour contract structure, public goods and urban economics appear in leading academic journals such as *American Economic Review*, *Journal of Economic Theory*, *Rand Journal of Economics*, *Economica*, *European Economic Review*, *Canadian Journal of Economics*, *Journal of Public Economic Theory*, *Economics Letters*, and *Transportations Research*. Based on the frequency of citations of his publications in the Social Science Citation Index, he is listed in Mark Blaug's (2nd and 3rd editions), "Who's Who in Economics". He has consulted widely for both private and public organizations. At the height of the financial panic in 2008–09, he wrote several articles on the crisis, and edited a book *Globalisation and Financial Crisis*.
