# CALL FOR PAPERS

## Young Scholars in Southeast Asian Studies

To mark the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the ISEAS – Yusof Ishak Institute, a special issue of *Contemporary Southeast Asia* will be published in August 2018 to showcase original research being conducted by young scholars working on Southeast Asia.

*Contemporary Southeast Asia* is a peer-reviewed academic journal and one of the flagship publications of the ISEAS – Yusof Ishak Institute. Now in its fourth decade of publication, the journal has succeeded in building up an international reputation as one of Southeast Asia's premier academic journals by being listed in, among others, the Social Sciences Citation Index and SCOPUS.

Authors must be enrolled in a doctoral programme at a university or have graduated 12 months before 1 April 2018. Articles should be 6,000–8,000 words in length (including endnotes), and include a strong central argument, a compelling narrative, a rigorous analytical framework and make an original contribution to the literature.

Articles should focus on one or more of the following topics:

- The domestic politics of Southeast Asian countries.
- Security/strategic/defence issues in Southeast Asia.
- Southeast Asia's relations with the major powers.
- The role of ASEAN and/or ASEAN-led forums.
- The international affairs of Southeast Asia.

The best entries will be published in the August 2018 issue of *Contemporary Southeast Asia* and receive an honorarium of S\$500.
