ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

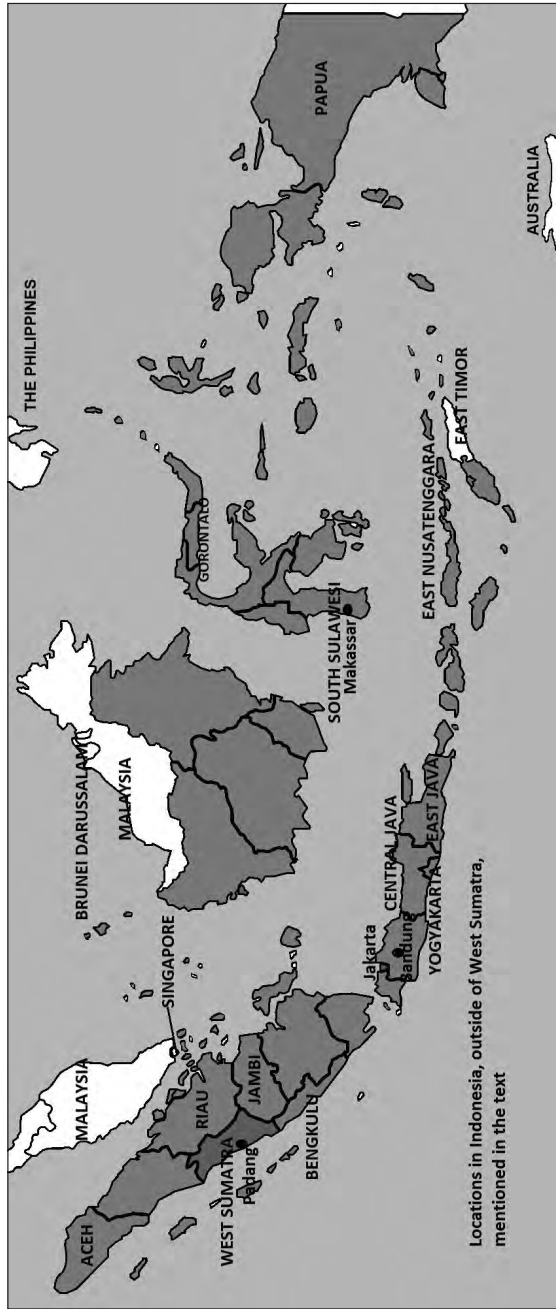

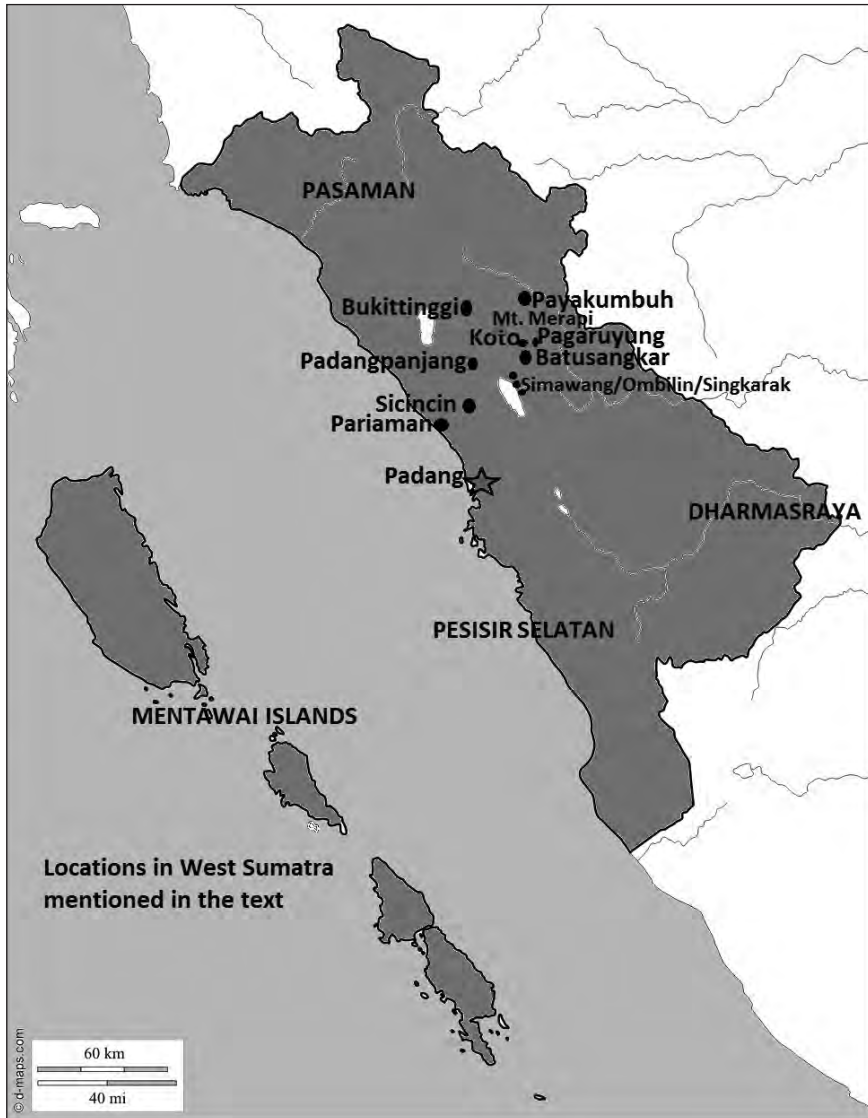

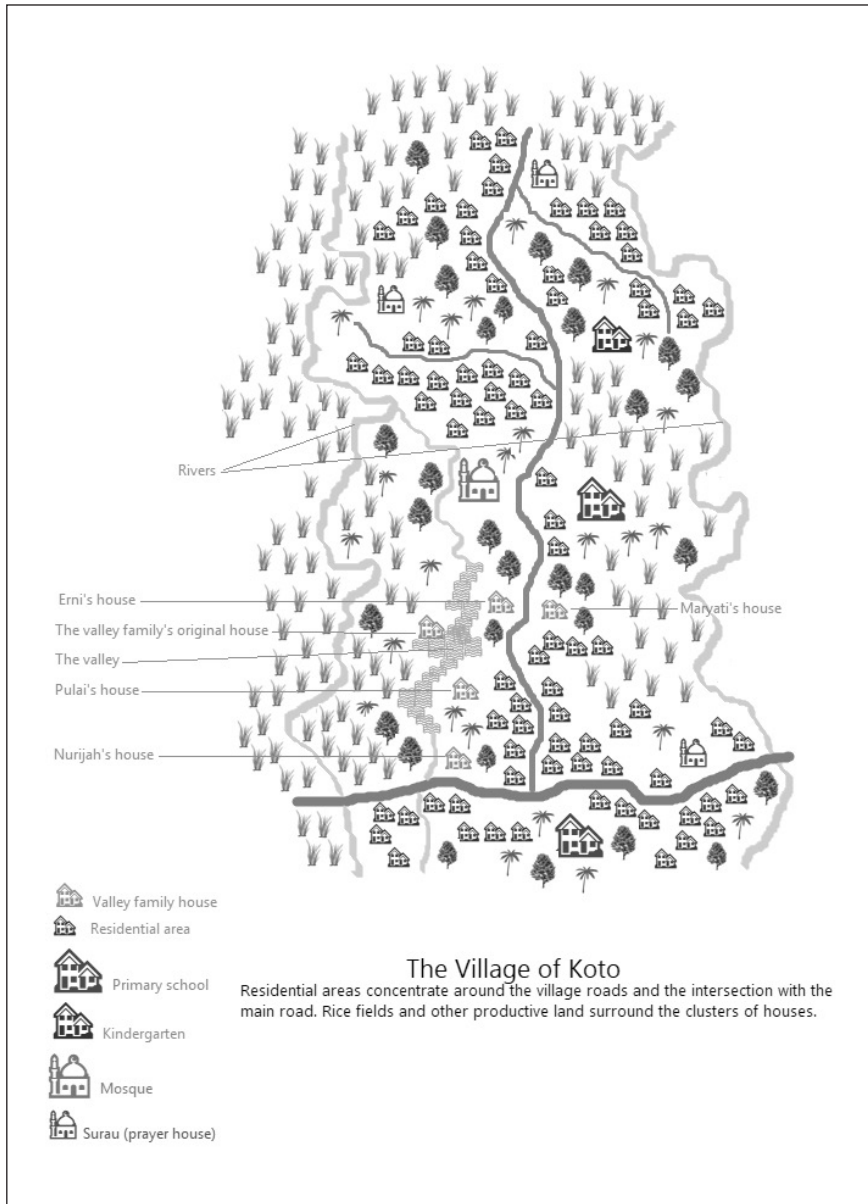
Map of Indonesia



Map of West Sumatra

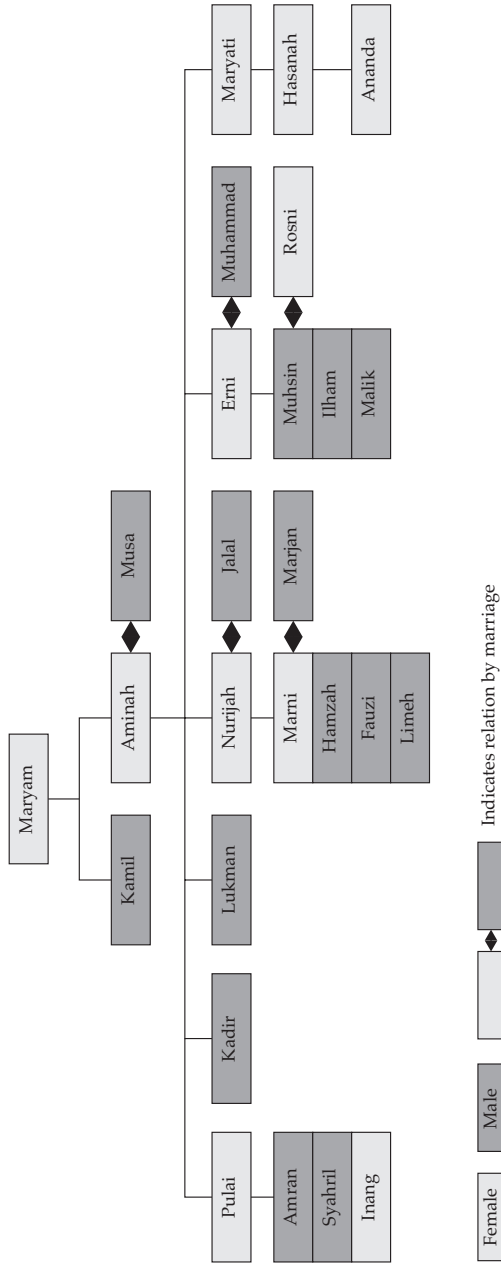


Map of the Village of Koto
