Oral Histories

The following oral histories were recorded by the Oral History Centre, a division of the National Archives of Singapore, which in turn is part of the National Library Board of Singapore. These verbal accounts of Singapore's past are largely accessible to all via online searches of the names and Accession Numbers stated below, at the website <https://www.nas.gov.sg>.

Abdul Gaffor bin Abdul Hamid. Accession Number (AN) 001430. This telephone operator at the Istana recalled being kept very busy every day with the volume of calls from President Wee Kim Wee's many friends and well-wishers.

Vaidyanathan Thirunavukkarasu (V.T. Arasu). AN 002307. His significant mentions of Dr Wee, that is, Dr Wee advising him to mind Japan's sensitivities while chronicling the Japanese Occupation of Singapore, are recorded in Reel 20 of his interviews.

Maurice Baker. AN 000554. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's clamouring for a diplomatic posting beyond Kuala Lumpur are in Reel 3.

Chiang Hai Ding. AN 002716. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's wisdom in continuing to cultivate his social networks in retirement are in Reel 32.

Lieutenant-General (Retired) Winston Choo Wee Leong. AN 003026. He recalled how Dr Wee once helped Singapore soldiers push a boat stuck in muddy waters in Reel 3.

Fong Chan Yoon. AN 002332. In Reel 17, he recalled how supportive Dr Wee was to the elderly, including championing Senior Citizens' Week. Leslie Fong Yin Leong. AN 003849. His significant mentions of Dr Wee as a stern boss who put on a rather stiff front among colleagues are in Reels 8–11.

Brother Pierre Paul @ Emmanuel Gaudette. AN 001739. In Reel 16, he recalled how close Dr Wee was with Dr Ee Peng Liang and their reactions after both were considered for the presidency of the Republic of Singapore.

Alfred Goh Kok Kee. AN 003208. His significant mentions of the challenges and occasional hilarity of being aide-de-camp to Dr Wee, and how grandfatherly Dr Wee was to him, are in Reels 1 and 2.

Graham Starforth Hill. AN E000054. His lauding of Dr Wee as a national treasure is in Reel 9.

Idris Mohamed Ali. AN 003979. He recalled being commissioned to paint a portrait of President and Mrs Wee Kim Wee towards the end of their term at the Istana.

Ismail bin Abdul Ghani. AN 003318. He recalled Dr Wee's days at the Istana as Singapore's fourth president in Reel 1 of his seven recorded interviews.

Ambrose Anthony Khaw Tai Wah. AN 003830. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's chequered career and constant pressures as a journalist are in Reels 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 47, 50 and 51.

Khoo Teng Soon. AN 000475. As one of Dr Wee's closest friends, as well as being his long-time boss at the *Straits Times*, Mr Khoo mentioned Dr Wee in Reel 15.

Lau Teng Chuan. AN 001888. He marvelled at how widely known Dr Wee was to all badminton-mad Malaysians, and how wise he was.

Lee Ah Jee. AN 003215. She recalled how humble and fuss-free Dr Wee and his wife were at the Istana, and how they would give her and all other Istana staff thoughtful festive gifts.

Lee Kip Lee. AN 002956. His significant mentions of how Dr Wee inspired him to start a magazine for the Peranakan community are in Reel 2.

Lee Liang Hye. AN 002186. His significant mentions of how supportive Dr Wee and his wife were of the Peranakan community are in Reel 9.

John Leow Swee Gek. AN 004394. He recalled Dr Wee as a beloved family friend.

Lim Jiat Kin. AN 003896. He recalled how supportive Dr Wee was of the grassroots.

Arthur Lim Siew Ming. AN E 000004. He made the conjecture in Reel 2 of his interviews that Dr Wee seemed to him a fair-weather friend.

Sunny Low. AN 002423. His father, Low Poh San, was Dr Wee's ballroom-dancing instructor, and he recalled in Reel 1 how Dr Wee became a beloved family friend.

Colonel (Retired) John Morrice. AN 003306. His significant mentions of working with Dr Wee at the High Commission in Kuala Lumpur are in Reel 12.

Sellapan Ramanathan (S.R. Nathan). AN 002963. His significant mentions of Dr Wee as his colleague and friend are in Reels 2 and 11.

David Ng Shin Chong. AN 000670. He recalled being Dr Wee's trusted family photographer whom Dr Wee also hired to help him take photographs for news agency, the United Press Association.

Ong Poh Lim. AN 001932. He recalled how adept Dr Wee was at organising social dos for the badminton community in Singapore.

Balji Poravankara. AN 003826. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's harried weeks when his staff at the *Straits Times* went on strike in December 1971 are in Reels 6, 7, 9 and 10.

Subaraj Rajathurai. AN 004236. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's strong support for his proposal to set up the Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve are in Reel 3.

Kasinather Saunthararajah (K.S. Rajah). AN 002088. He recalled what a gentleman Dr Wee was.

Rufino Soliano. AN 003704. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's charm and elan as a ballroom dancer at Raffles Hotel on weekends are in Reels 2 and 5.

Utamani d/o Tambisamy. AN 003201. She recalled what it was like to serve Dr and Mrs Wee at the Istana, and the tweaks that the Wees introduced to the running of the Istana.

Tan Hwee Hock. AN 004045. His significant mentions of Dr Wee's strong and much welcome support for Singapore's sportspeople at international meets are in Reel 19.

Tan Wee Him. AN 003058. He was hired by Dr Wee in May 1970 as a photographer for the *Straits Times* and recalled being mentored by him.

Wong Shang Hoon. AN 001518. He recalled in Reel 1 how friendly Dr Wee was with the staff at the Istana, sometimes even cooking simple Peranakan fare for them.
