This issue of *SOJOURN* includes both refereed articles and a first selection of papers from a workshop organized by the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies on Migrations in Contemporary Southeast Asia, held in Singapore on 22–23 January 1998, and funded by the Ford Foundation.* The workshop papers in this issue include two articles and five country reports covering Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, and the Philippines.
